

Biblical Fellowship, the Way God Intended!

Do you love your Church family? If you don't know your church family or know the purpose of your church family, you will have a hard time loving your church family! The Bible teaches a special purpose of love within the Church Family: "A new commandment I give to you that you love one another. Even as I have loved you, so shall you love one another. By this will all men know that you're my disciples in that you love one another." (John 13: 24-25)

The American church culture seems to have little understanding of the meaning of Biblical fellowship that enables a church family to stay strong and united through holocaust, war, persecution, moral failure, disagreement, and more. The Bible says that we are to experience Biblical fellowship, and here's what it looks like.

Unity. Many of the one-another commands deal with the unity of the church. Be at peace with one another. Don't grumble among one another. Be of the same mind with one another. Accept one another. Don't bite and devour one another. Don't boastfully challenge or envy one another. Gently, patiently tolerate one another. Be kind, tender-hearted, and forgiving to one another. Bear with and forgive one another. Seek good for one another, and don't repay evil for evil. Don't complain against one another. Confess sins to one another.

Love. Many of the one-another commands instruct Christians to love. Love one another. Through love, serve one another. Tolerate one another in love. Be devoted to one another in love.

Humility. An attitude of humility among believers is presumed. Give preference to one another in honor. Regard one another as more important than yourselves. Serve one another. Don't be haughty: be of the same mind. Be subject to one another. Clothe yourselves in humility toward one another.

Here's a few more: Do not judge one another, and don't put a stumbling block in a brother's way. Bear one another's burdens. Speak truth to one another in love. Don't lie to one another. Comfort one another concerning the resurrection. Encourage and build up one another. Stimulate one another to love and good deeds. Pray for one another. Be hospitable to one another.

This is the true meaning of Biblical fellowship. We are a community of faith with Jesus as our Lord and filled with the Holy Spirit of God. We hold no man too highly, but we trust and obey Jesus and we choose to love one another.

In the Word, we are instructed to gather together like it says in Hebrews 10:24-25 "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing pear."



Community Needs


Our community has two families that have been hit hard by life. We ask for prayers on their behalf, and if you are able, for your generosity.

Nick Staley, a member of our community ministry in Simpsonville, has Stage 3 seminoma testicular cancer. The cancer has spread to his lower spine, lymph nodes, lung and spleen. He has had surgery but further surgeries are too dangerous. Nick will undergo weeks of aggressive chemotherapy in Indiana. Nick and Lyric have 2 teen daughters, a 7 year old son and twin 2 year old boys. Nick will work as much as he can but that will soon come to an end. Bills will continue to come in, there will be extra fuel expenses due to driving daily to Indiana...and it's Christmas and winter. A contribution can be made through SBC.



Aaron Shirley has been diagnosed with a large brain tumor. The tumor is in the left frontal lobe down into the insulae and toward the temporal lobe and there are risks in having it removed.

Aaron is unable $t\bar{o}$ drive, cannot work and will need to be taken to appointments. He has applied for short-term disability and is awaiting approval which will help some but will not be his full pay. Alexis had already started a second job.




We are excited to report that we now have 9 children in the rescue center. They are pictured here with some of their new clothing they received for Christmas.

Kentucky Today

Kentucky Baptist Disaster Relief Director Ron Crow has been amazed at the response from those wanting to volunteer and help with the cleanup efforts in tornado-stricken western Kentucky. It's also going to be a mighty task. "The destruction we have seen is extreme," Crow said in the aftermath of Friday's tornadoes. "But God is still good." Approximately 140 trained Kentucky Disaster Relief volunteers have responded and are ready to serve in the hard-hit Mayfield area. They are currently assessing the damage to know what kind of equipment and resources are going to be needed. Teams of workers will be assembling in the days ahead to begin the work of cleaning up. Many untrained volunteers have expressed a desire to help as well. If you're an untrained volunteer, Crow first thanks you for your desire to help those in western Kentucky who are rebuilding homes and lives and is looking for a way that they can help. Kentucky Disaster Relief provides training five times a year throughout the state to make sure workers understand how to use the equipment properly and safely.

There is still an abundance of opportunities to serve in the Mayfield and western Kentucky areas.



The parks are open to people who need shelter as a result of the tornadoes. - --Volunteers are needed at the Mayfield-Graves County Fairgrounds to help load and unload donations and help organize donations.




KEEP CLIMBING: Why God Doesn't Give You Everything You Want **By Todd Phillips**


Why isn't God making my life easier?






In this two-session study called Tensions, your group will explore how to move toward people who see things differently—instead of moving away from them.
